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STUDENT-CENTRED LEARNING (SCL) ROOMS CREATE CONDUCIVE LEARNING ENVIRONMENT



UUM ONLINE: The upgrading of the traditional lecture rooms into student-centred learning rooms (SCL) at the Tunku Puteri Intan Safinaz School of Accountancy (TISSA) is seen as a viable way to afford students with a conducive learning environment.

Chairman of the Fng Ah Seng Muhibah Foundation, Prof. Tan Sri Dato' Paduka Dr. Fng Ah Seng said that the lecture rooms built with the SCL concept in mind would provide both students and lecturers with a setting where they can discuss subject matters and lessons with colleagues and friends; become a platform to encourage the sharing of ideas and findings through presentation while utilising state-of-the-art technology facilities made available to gain information and resources.

According to him, traditional lecturer-based lecture rooms were less relevant in meeting the criteria of student-centred learning hence the upgrading of traditional lecture rooms at TISSA-UUM to the SCL concept was timely.

"In the midst of the ever-challenging student-oriented education, I understand the challenges faced by the university in providing the best learning environment for students.

"I believe that with the refurbishment process complete, conducive learning environment can be met as expected because ultimately, we expect graduates that are produced not only possess good knowledge, but are also highly motivated, creative and able to think critically and possess innovative skills, all due to the training gained through student-centred learning," he said this at the Student-Centred Learning (SCL) Room Launching Ceremony, yesterday.

Prof. Tan Sri Dato' Paduka Dr. Fng Ah Seng who is also the Adjunct Professor at TISSA-UUM said the upgrading the learning infrastructure at TISSA-UUM was part of the agenda of Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) signed by Muhibah Foundation with UUM back in 2016.

He also expressed hopes that the cooperation would continue and generate synergy which will benefit both parties and further support the aspirations of producing high quality leaders who will in turn lead the country in terms of its leadership and economy.

Meanwhile, the Dean of TISSA-UUM, Assoc. Prof. Dr. Chek Derashid said the upgrading of the lecture rooms also took into account the direction of education which not only focused on technical knowledge, but also on the development of soft skills that requires interaction between lecturers and students.

He said that up to 11 traditional lecture rooms were upgraded to enhance the quality of services offered to students.

"I hope that the cooperation between TISSA and Muhibah Foundation will benefit the students, thus making them competitive graduates who are equipped with industry-required skills," he said.
